12th Annual Diamond BallBeyond Tomorrow

More than 550 of the most philanthropic members in our community came together on October 27 to celebrate the 12th Annual Diamond Ball: Beyond Tomorrow at the JW Marriott Marquis Miami. The event raised over \$1 million to benefit the children and families cared for at Nicklaus Children's Hospital.

Hosted by WPLG Local 10 news anchor Laurie Jennings, the event focused on innovation and set the mood for the induction of African stateswoman, Graça Machel into the Ambassador David M. Walters International Pediatric Hall of Fame. Induction into the Hall of Fame is the highest honor bestowed by Nicklaus Children's Hospital Foundation and each inductee has demonstrated a passionate commitment to ensure the health and happiness of children worldwide.

During the event, two Nicklaus Children's patients were honored; Layla A'leea Walker, 7, an orthopedic patient diagnosed with early onset scoliosis, and Manchester Isabella, 2, a girl from Honduras, who is currently receiving life-saving care at Nicklaus Children's Hospital for acute lymphoblastic leukemia.

Donations made throughout the night will fund a treatment called Kymriah, also known as CAR-T. Nicklaus Children's is proud to be one of a few children's hospitals nationwide to offer Kymriah, a novel immuno-oncology treatment that uses the patient's own immune system to seek out and destroy cancer cells. This treatment provides the chance of a cure for children struggling after a cancer relapse,

and holds promise as the care standard of the future for a wide range of cancers.

Patients with recurrent or 'refractory' leukemia have less than a 5 percent chance of remission with repetition of prior treatment and may be candidates for stem cell transplantation. With Kymriah, these same patients have a greater than 90 percent chance of remission a month after the infusion.

Bake a Difference

This October, dozens of caring community members set up bake stands across Miami-Dade and Broward counties as part of the 4th Annual Bake a Difference, a day-long event that raises funds and awareness for the Comprehensive Epilepsy Program at Nicklaus Children's Hospital.

When their daughter and sister, Samantha was diagnosed with epilepsy, Amy, Doug and Evie Hirschhorn saw a need and desire to

give back to the hospital that helped care for Samantha. They wanted to give anyone the opportunity to "bake" a difference and participate in a family-friendly, inclusive event. This year, volunteers baked cupcakes, brownies, cookies and other sweet treats, and collected donations totaling more than \$36,000. Altogether since 2014, Bake a Difference participants have raised more than \$100,000 to fund new equipment and less invasive surgery techniques.







Established in 2010, the Nicklaus Children's Hospital Young Ambassadors (NCYA) have taken their mission to heart. With over \$1 million raised, NCYA has played a significant role as advocates for the Nicklaus Children's mission and funded important projects all across our organization.

At only 4 years old, Sofia Isabel Blanco was diagnosed with an aggressive form of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a blood cancer affecting the lymphatic system.

Sofia responded well to treatment, however, eight months later, she had her first bout with heart failure, a side effect of the chemotherapy used to treat her cancer. Once again, she responded well to treatment and was considered cured. She lived a happy, productive life for over eight years, but the damage to her heart was too severe and Sofia passed away in April 2012.

Ever so grateful for the care and support received by Nicklaus Children's Hospital, Sofia's mother, Marta, has been a true exemplary role model by dedicating much of her time to giving back to the hospital. Through her nonprofit, Sofia's Hope, she hosts monthly arts and crafts activities, sponsors Family Fun Nights, distributes kits for newly diagnosed families, provides gift cards for newly diagnosed teen patients, donates gifts for the holidays, and so much more throughout the year.

Marta misses Sofia every day but knows the best way to honor her daughter is by providing hope to others facing a childhood cancer diagnosis.

Ring in a healthy new year by teaching kids the importance of healthy eating. As with any part of raising children, role modeling is key. You can help raise healthy eaters by doing your best to:

Serve balanced meals and snacks that are age-appropriate with a variety of nutrient-rich foods such as whole grains, fresh fruits and vegetables, lean means and low-fat dairy products.

Provide calm, pleasant meal times where adults and children can talk and share stories. Traditions are formed around the dinner table.

Remove distractions such as television, phones and tablets so that your attention is on each other.

Share an appreciation for healthy foods by learning and educating on the health benefits of the foods at the table.

Make food safety, such as hand washing part of every eating occasion.

Make family meal times a priority. If dinner time is difficult for all family members to sit together, set aside time for a weekend breakfast or lunch.

Get kids involved. Every trip to the supermarket can be a nutrition lesson. Encourage them to choose new foods that they want to try. Older kids can help in menu planning and even meal preparation.

Eat five servings of fruits and vegetables every day. Two servings of fruits and three servings of vegetables daily will provide your body with the antioxidants you need to stay healthy.

Make a plan to increase physical activity. The goal is 60 minutes per day, five times per week.

THE VICTOR CENTER FOR THE PREVENTION OF JEWISH GENETIC DISEASES

The Nicklaus Children's Hospital Victor Center for the Prevention of Jewish Genetic Diseases is a thought leader in the prevention of genetic diseases. Science-based and mission driven, the Victor Center leverages advances in genetic technology to identify carriers of severe and often fatal childhood diseases more prevalent in the Jewish community.

Since its inception, the Victor Center has hosted over 60 screening events, and have found statistically that one in two of its participants are carriers for at least one gene mutation of over 200 different disorders. This past September, Jaret Davis, Chair of the Nicklaus Children's Hospital Board of Directors, led the Genes and Cocktails event at the Greenberg Traurig law office in Miami. With nearly 100 guests in attendance, Mr. Davis shared updates on what is new in 2018 with regards to genetic testing and personalized medicine.

In November of 2018, the Victor Center welcomed Shari Debowsky as its new Senior Outreach Associate. Shari will now serve alongside long-time Victor Center outreach coordinator and genetic counselor, Debbie Wasserman.

NICKLAUS CHILDREN'S VERIFIED AS LEVEL 1 PEDIATRIC TRAUMA CENTER BY THE AMERICAN COLLEGE OF SURGEONS

Nicklaus Children's Hospital has been verified as a Level 1 Pediatric Trauma Center by the American College of Surgeons (ACS) and is the only hospital in South Florida to achieve Level 1 Pediatric Trauma Center verification.

The Miguel "Mike" B. Fernandez Family Pediatric Trauma Center at Nicklaus Children's is one of only two freestanding pediatric trauma centers in the state of Florida and the only freestanding facility in South Florida dedicated exclusively to the care of children and young adults. Our trauma physicians are board certified in pediatric surgery and the clinical staff is comprised of certified pediatric trauma clinicians. The trauma center includes four treatment bays capable of treating up to eight traumatically injured patients. Nicklaus Children's Hospital has a longstanding history of providing pediatric trauma services to children in our community and is home to one of the busiest emergency rooms in the nation. The trauma center is supported by the hospital's pediatric intensive care unit (PICU), a critical care unit that provides life-saving monitoring and treatment for critically ill children, utilizing the most advanced therapies and technologies.

The PICU was recognized with a Gold-Level Beacon Award by the American Association of Critical-Care Nurses (AACN).

NICKLAUS CHILDREN'S HEALTH SYSTEM NAMED 2018 CHIME HEALTHCARE'S MOST WIRED RECIPIENT

Nicklaus Children's Health System has been named the 2018 Most Wired Hospital by the College of Healthcare Information Management Executives (CHIME). Nicklaus Children's is recognized as the No. 1 ranked hospital amongst a list of more than 250 across the nation.

This award recognizes hospitals and health systems that are at the forefront of using healthcare IT to improve the delivery of care, have maximized the benefits of foundational technologies, and are embracing new technologies that support population management and value-based care.

"This award is a testament to our commitment to using the latest

NICKLAUS CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL WINS DNV GL HEALTHCARE'S INNOVATION OF THE YEAR AWARD

Nicklaus Children's Hospital has been awarded DNV GL Healthcare's Innovation of the Year award for the development and implementation of an automated crash cart management solution that has dramatically enhanced patient care and efficiency at the 309-bed freestanding children's hospital and its network of outpatient centers.

The value of checking crash carts extends beyond compliance with regulatory standards. As a healthcare organization, having life-saving equipment, medications and supplies in order and reviewed daily saves lives. This crash cart solution was born at Nicklaus Children's Hospital, through its continuous focus on leading industry innovation. This automated process was created with key stakeholders from multiple departments such as nursing, information technology, pharmacy and accreditation, in collaboration with Nesa Solutions, a leading provider of workflow automation and information management services.

The crash cart module digitalizes daily workflows and automates asset management by sending instant notifications to the responsible departments to better manage replenishment processes and promote sustainability. This solution has decreased risk while enhancing a culture of patient safety, standardization and simplification that has provided significant cost savings to the health system.

The Healthcare Innovation of the Year award was presented at the 2018 DNV GL Healthcare Symposium: The Future of Accreditation,

attended by hundreds of healthcare professionals in quality, accreditation and leadership throughout the United States. Dr. Narendra Kini, CEO of Nicklaus Children's Health System, accepted the award via video link. Dr. Kini has been the inspiration for the hospital's steadfast pursuit of innovation and the latest technology to advance patient care.



SPIRIT HALLOWEEN CELEBRATES ANNUAL SPIRIT OF CHILDREN HALLOWEEN PARTY

Nicklaus Children's Hospital, in partnership with Spirit Halloween, hosted a Halloween party through the Spirit of Children program for patients and their families complete with costumes, games and crafts. The party was extremely uplifting for children who otherwise would not have been able to participate in typical Halloween celebrations.

Since the partnership between Spirit Halloween and Nicklaus Children's Hospital began in 2010, Spirit of Children has raised more than \$750,000 in critical funding for the Hospital's Child Life Department. In 2018 alone, Nicklaus Children's received a total of \$82,154. Funds for Spirit of Children are raised via donations from customers at local Spirit Halloween stores and SpiritHalloween.com, in addition to contributions from vendors and business partners.

One hundred percent of funds raised each year stay in South Florida and are donated to Nicklaus Children's Hospital.





THE TAFT FOUNDATION

The Taft Foundation was established in 2004 by Don Taft, a businessman and philanthropic leader in Broward County. The charitable organization's mission is to improve the lives of children and adults with serious medical conditions and intellectual, developmental and physical disabilities - primarily in Florida and New York. The Red Nose Docs offer the magic of healthcare clowns to alleviate the stress for young patients, their families and their circle of caregivers. Using an array of circus and theater skills, the professional, specially trained performers work in teams of two to create spontaneous, joyful encounters, reintroducing play and fun as natural parts of the hospital experience.





NEW LITERACY INITIATIVE WITH THE FETAL CARE CENTER

Did you know that 80 percent of a child's brain development occurs in the first three years of life?

As part of an initiative for the Nicklaus Children's Hospital Fetal Care Center and the development of early language and literacy for newborns, Saima Aftab, MD, Director of the Fetal Care Center has launched the "Reading is Healing" campaign. For every \$20 donated towards this campaign, a box of new books will be delivered to the patients in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at Nicklaus Children's Hospital. 






Patient Stories

Justin

The moment Justin was born, his mother and father were faced with the most daunting and challenging experience any parent can imagine. Just hours after birth, Justin was airlifted to Nicklaus Children's Hospital for more specialized pediatric care.



Fast forward 13 years later, and Justin is still receiving the same quality care from the exact same team who received him in the NICU the day he was born. From reconstructive surgery to multiple catheterizations and constant follow-ups, Redmond Burke, MD, pediatric cardiac surgeon, Danielle Madril, MD, pediatric cardiac anesthesiologist, and Justin's core team at Nicklaus Children's Hospital have been there every step of the way.

Gabriela

Following an emergency C-section, Gabriela's mother, Katherine, was shocked to see that her new baby was missing part of her face. Gabriela was born with a cleft lip and palate.

Katherine researched for hours to find the best doctors to fix her daughter's condition and came upon the craniofacial

team at Nicklaus Children's Hospital. She knew Nicklaus Children's was the right place for her baby daughter and entrusted her in the care of S. Anthony Wolfe, MD, Mislen Bauer, MD, and Marta Mejia, MD. Gabriela had two surgeries at Nicklaus Children's Hospital by the time she was 18 months old, and after her second surgery, her mother said it was like the doctors handed her a whole new baby.

Now a typical 8 year old who loves painting and playing with her friends, Gabriela's scars are hardly noticeable, but the lessons she has taught her family will last a lifetime.

Mateo

When Mateo was just two years old, his parents were shocked to discover that their toddler developed leukemia. They met with the hematology and oncology specialists at Nicklaus Children's Hospital and began a treatment protocol that brought

What began as a routine checkup during her 36th week of pregnancy, turned out to be a surprisingly daunting diagnosis for Sylvia, and her unborn baby, Luis Fernando, nicknamed Luife.



While he was still inside his mother's womb, Luife was diagnosed with transposition of the great arteries, a congenital heart defect, where the large vessels that carry blood from the heart to the lungs and to the body, were improperly connected. His heart, as described by Redmond Burke MD, Director of Cardiovascular Surgery at Nicklaus Children's Hospital, was like a "jigsaw puzzle with all the pieces put together backwards."

Sylvia was living in Venezuela and her doctors recommended she seek treatment in Miami. Shortly after birth, Luife was taken by ambulance to the cardiac team at Nicklaus Children's. With little time to lose, doctors took Luife's heart apart, piece by delicate piece, and successfully, put it back together.

Today, Luife is a healthy, active and outgoing 8-year-old boy who wears his "Scar of Honor" (which his mom says he earned because he's a warrior!) with pride. He enjoys spending time with his family as well as playing soccer, tennis, and running.


Charlie
